ARCHAEOLOGICAL VIOLATION INVESTIGATION CLASS

CLASS ANNOUNCEMENT

Archaeological Damage Investigation & Assessment (ADIA; the new business name for Martin McAllister's firm) has scheduled an offering of the firm's three-day Archaeological Violation Investigation Class in Winchester, Kentucky, Wednesday, October 12 through Friday, October 14, 2011. The class will be hosted by the USDA Forest Service, Daniel Boone National Forest and the Kentucky Heritage Council and State Historic Preservation Office. This announcement includes information on the class location, lodging and logistics (see below). The class description and class schedule also are provided as part of announcement (see below). This class is open to all federal, tribal, state and other government agency law enforcement officers, archaeologists and prosecuting attorneys. (USDA Forest Service law enforcement officers should note that their agency has determined that this class meets their ARPA training requirements.) **The registration deadline for the class is close of business on Friday, September 16, 2011.**

Class Registration:

There is not a class registration form.

The class tuition fee is **\$350.00**. Arrangements for payment of the tuition fee must be made by the class registration deadline. Class Logistical Information:

Class Location: The class will be held at the Daniel Boone National Forest Supervisor's Office located at 1700 Bypass Road in Winchester, Kentucky (phone number: 859-745-3100).

Lodging: Participants are responsible for making their own lodging arrangements. A block of rooms is being held for the class at the Comfort Inn at 2381 Buena Vista Drive in Lexington Kentucky (phone number: 859-299-0302). This hotel is located just off Interstate 75 at Exit 110 and is about a 15 or 20 minute drive from the classroom. The rate is the federal government lodging rate of \$70.00 (plus tax without a tax exempt number). The lodging rooms will be held until September 16, 2011, under the designation "ARPA." Please tell them you would like a room in the "ARPA" block of rooms when you make your reservation.

Other Class Logistics:

The class will begin promptly at 8:00 AM on Wednesday, October 12, and will end no later than 3:30 PM on Friday, October 14.

Printed class materials will be provided to class participants. Class participants should bring note-taking materials. Basic evidence documentation and collection equipment and supplies will be provided to class participants for the Archaeological Crime Scene Practical Exercise on Wednesday afternoon. Participants may bring their own equipment for the practical exercise if desired, but this is not necessary.

Dress for the class will be casual. Participants should bring clothing and footwear suitable for spending two to three hours outdoors during the Archaeological Crime Scene Practical Exercise on Wednesday afternoon. The practical exercise will be held in the vicinity of the classroom so backcountry footwear and other backcountry gear are not required.

Each class participant will receive a certificate upon successful completion of the class.

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
Class Description

ADIA's three-day Archaeological Violation Investigation Class provides training on all aspects of the investigation and prosecution of archaeological crimes. Instructors for the class are Archaeologist Martin McAllister and Investigator David Griffel who are recognized national experts in this area of law enforcement. Topics covered in the class are:

- An Overview of Archaeological Resource Crime
- The Looting, Collecting and Trafficking Network
- ARPA and Other Federal Statutes
- The Kentucky State Antiquities Act and Other State Statutes
- Archaeological Crime Scene Investigation
- Archaeological Damage Assessment
- Archaeological Crime Investigative Methods
- Archaeological Damage Assessment Methods
- Archaeological Violation Case Studies

An archaeological crime scene practical exercise also is included in the class. In this exercise, class participants will be required to carry out crime scene investigation and field damage assessment procedures at a mock archaeological crime scene.

Targeted participants for the class are law enforcement officers and archaeologists employed by federal, tribal, state and local government agencies and federal, tribal, state and county prosecuting attorneys. Participants will receive a certificate of completion at the conclusion of the class.
